Protecting Yourself from Scams

A scam is a fraudulent scheme designed to deceive people into giving away their money or personal information.

Types of Scams (Not A Complete List)

- Phishing scams
- Prize/Sweepstakes Lottery scams
- Government Impersonation scams
- Medicare and health insurance scams
- COVID-19 scams
- Computer tech support scams

- Investment scams
- Romance Scams
- Computer Tech Support scams
- Robocalls and phone scams

- Internet & Email scams

Red Flags

- Pressure to act quickly: scammers often try to create a sense of urgency to trick you into making a decision without thinking it through.
- Requests for personal information: scammers may ask for your Social Security number, credit card information, or other sensitive information.
- Requests for payment upfront: scammers may ask for payment in advance for services or products that are never delivered.
- Too good to be true: if a relationship seems to be moving too quickly or if someone seems too perfect, it may be a scam.

Tips for Protecting Yourself

- Verify the identity of the person or organization before giving out any personal information.
- Do not respond to emails or phone calls from unknown sources.
- Don't trust caller ID, as scammers can use technology to display a fake phone number.
- Don't send money or provide personal information to anyone you don't know.
- Don't trust promises of big rewards or money for little work.
- Be cautious of online relationships that move quickly and involve requests for money.

Stay Vigilant and Stay Safe

- Do discuss finances with close family members. Our tradition of not discussing finances with our close family members isolates us and makes us vulnerable to be scammed.
- Do not talk to people you have never met in real life.
- Do not do business with anyone you have never met in person.
- Do not give out your private information to people you have not met in person in real life.

Loan Periods & Item Limits

Patrons with accounts in good standing (owing less than \$10 in fines) may check out the following:

21-Day Loan Period

- All books
- All audiobooks

7-Day Loan Period

- Magazines
- DVDs (limit 4)
- Hotspots (limit 1)

Lost, Stolen, or Missing Items

Patrons are responsible for the items checked out to their library account, including lost and damaged items. Lost library cards can be replaced for \$1. Damaged library cards can be replaced for free.

Renewing Items

Most items can be renewed up to two times, unless another patron has requested the item for checkout. Hotspots are not eligible for renewals.

Access the Library Catalog Online

Access your library account to see items checked out, items you have requested, borrow eMedia, and find library events at hiawathalibrary.org.

Fines & Fees

There are no fines for items returned after their due date, with the exception of hotspots. However, if an account has accumulated fees by way of overdue hotspots or damaged/lost items, no additional items may be checked out.

How to Get a Library Card

Adults are issued a library card after providing proof of current address. Children must be in first grade and have a caregiver sign their application to receive a library card.

Cards for Child 17 & Under

Caregivers are responsible for their children's library cards and the items checked out on their account(s). Only legal guardians/custodians are allowed to access a child's account. Caregivers may allow permissions for item types checked out and/or to use public computers.

In order to check out materials, patrons need to have their card with them.
You can add it to your digital wallet, use our keyring-size card, or even have a picture of the number and barcode on your phone.


Wildlife Adventures
